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Mina Das (Keynote Speaker)

Director of NISHTHA, Bengal, India

NISHTHA was born in a very remote village of South 24 Parganas by a group of rural women who were victims of gender discrimination and had a mission of empowering the village women. Mina Das has lead the organization for over 30 years, and will share the story of NISHTHA as well as her experiences working to empower women and girls through gender equity initiatives, education and health promotion, as well as the organizations emphasis on self-sufficiency in efforts to bring clean water, safe handling and hygiene education to rural women in West Bengal.

Director of WaterCredit

Rinne comes to Water.org after nearly a decade focused on international microfinance, where she worked with dozens of microfinance institutions (MFIs), investment funds and organizations seeking to expand access to capital in the developing world. As the global director of Water.org's WaterCredit initiative, Rinne is responsible for expanding the network of WaterCredit MFI partners and forging linkages between the microfinance and water/sanitation sectors more broadly. This empowers more MFIs to offer financial products focused on the water and sanitation needs of their clients, thereby enabling more people to have access to clean water and safe sanitation while deploying philanthropic, social and commercial capital more efficiently.

Anastasia Shown is the Assistant Director of the University of Pennsylvania's African Studies Center. At the African Studies Center, Anastasia runs outreach programs to educate the larger public about Africa. She assists educators, media entities, health professionals, students and businesses in demystifying stereotypes and understanding historical & contemporary Africa. Anastasia fulfilled her B.A. at Indiana University and the University of Ghana, Legon majoring in Women Studies and Sociology. She earned her Master of Social Work degree at the University of Pennsylvania's School of Social Policy and Practice. Anastasia was awarded a Global Health Fellowship in Ghana through the Penn School of Medicine, the Hewlett Award for Innovation in International Offerings for an introduction to development work course taught in Ghana, the Global Young Advocate Award by the United Nations Association of America and a Fulbright-Hays grant to train U.S. educators in Ethiopia. Anastasia co-founded the Sisterhood of Justice Scholarship to support women in her hometown committed to social justice. Anastasia has conducted fieldwork on service-learning, reproductive health, education, community development, sickle cell disease and water/sanitation. Anastasia is a member of the Philadelphia Global Water Initiative, Engineers Without Borders, the Open Mind Grant for Africa, Up with People International, and the United Nations Association of Greater Philadelphia.

Caroline D'Angelo is the Pulitzer Center's social media editor. While at Penn, she obtained a master's degree in environmental studies, focusing on international environmental policy and communications. She won the Society of Women Environmental Professionals' graduate scholarship and the Dean's Scholar Award, in addition to several grants for international research and reporting projects in India, Sri Lanka, French Polynesia, Switzerland and France. She co-founded and serves as editor-in-chief for wH2O: The Journal of Gender & Water, the first journal on global water and women's issues. She designed the print publication, social media strategy and online presence of wH2O. She is also a Staff Writer and Managing Editor for the Initiative for Global Environmental Leadership at the Wharton School and Oikos Student Reporter.











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Dr. Shannon Marquez

Associate Dean for Academic Affairs, Director of Global Public Health Initiatives, Assoc. Professor of Environ. & Occ. Health Drexel University

Dr. Márquez is an accomplished educator, researcher, administrator and "public health engineer," who has garnered local, national and international recognition for research and practice in the field of global environmental health. Her international areas of focus include safe water systems, health systems strengthening and health governance, and agricultural health. Dr. Márquez also leads research on sustainable solutions to address the environmental burden of disease and health disparities in developing countries of Africa, and has also worked in Asia, and Latin America and underserved communities in the United States. Dr. Marquez holds a PhD in environmental sciences and engineering from the UNC Gillings School of Global Public Health, a Masters in Civil Engineering from Texas A&M University, and a BS in Mechanical Engineering from Prairie View A&M University

Dr. Susan Wachter

Richard B. Worley Professor of Financial Management and Professor of Real Estate and Finance at The Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania; Co-founder and –director of Penn Institute for Urban Research; Professor of City and Regional Planning

Dr. Wachter has served as President of the American Real Estate and Urban Economics Association and Co-Editor of Real Estate Economics. Dr. Wachter was Assistant Secretary for Policy Development and Research at HUD, a President appointed and Senate confirmed position, from 1998 to 2001. From 1996 to 1998 she was Chairperson of the Wharton Real Estate Department. Dr. Wachter, a nationally recognized expert on real estate markets, is frequently called upon to appear in national media and to testify before the U.S. Congress. Dr. Wachter also serves on the board of wH2O: The Journal of Gender & Water.

Lorena Aguilar

Senior Gender Advisor

International Union for the Conservation of Nature

Ms. Aguilar is a Global Senior Gender Advisor with more than twenty-five years of experience in projects and initiatives involving public policy development, building local institutions and the incorporation of social and gender issues into development. She established and consolidated the IUCN Global Gender Office, which is the preferred partner for international governments and non-governmental organizations seeking to promote gender equality and women empowerment for achieving biodiversity conservation and sustainable development. She has created and/or is part of some of the most influential international gender networks; e.g. the Network of Women Ministers and Leaders of the Environment and the Global Gender and Climate Alliance.

Kathleen O'Reilly Associate Professor

Texas A&M University

Kathleen O'Reilly studies the social and environmental impacts of development projects, especially those working toward improvements in health through gendered drinking water, sanitation, poverty interventions. Her research is based in India, where she has worked for the past 14 years. Her earliest research focused on community and women's participation in drinking water supply management, and was followed up in 2008 with a study investigating drinking water sustainability after the project's closure. The National Science Foundation supported research across 2005-2009 that explored the effects of development projects for the NGOs fieldworkers who implement them, and resulted in a better understanding of how global-scale development policies are locally transformed and spatialized through the actions of NGO fieldworkers. An NSF CAREER Award supports her current research into the causes and solutions to India's rural sanitation crisis. It seeks insights into how village-scale and household-scale dynamics involving caste, class, and gender influence toilet usage and non-usage in rural India. Kathleen contributed to the first issue of wH2O.











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Gemma Bulos

Director

Global Women's Water Initiative

Gemma Bulos is an award-winning social entrepreneur and the Director of the Global Women's Water Initiative. Prior to stepping in as Director of GWWI, Gemma was the Founder/Executive Director of A Single Drop (USA) and the Founding Director of A Single Drop for Safe Water in the Philippines, developing innovative programming that creates income- generating community-based water service organizations. For this innovation, Gemma received national and international social entrepreneur awards from Echoing Green (International, 2007), Ernst Young (Philippines 2009) and Schwab Foundation (Asia 2010), and others. Her programs also won accolades including the Tech Museum Tech Equality Award (2010) and Warriors of the UN Millennium Goals (2010), sponsored by Kodak Philippines. In 2011, she was recognized as one of the Most Influential Thought Leaders and Innovative Filipinas in the United States. Gemma serves on the board of wH2O: The Journal of Gender Water.

Murat Sahin Director, WASH in Schools UNICEF

Mr. Murat Sahin, Adviser responsible on WASH in Schools Programming works at Program Division at UNICEF Hqs since May 2009. Murat holds a masters degree in Business Administration and a Bachelor's degree in Civil Engineering. He has 15 years of experience, 13 of which spent with UNICEF's Water Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) and Education programs. He had worked in Turkey, Tajikistan, North Korea and New York. In New York, Murat advices UNICEF country Offices in 95 countries to scale up their WASH in Schools programs with quality. He also leads a coalition of 70 + partner organizations working on WASH in Schools programming at the global level. In North Korea, Murat managed WASH program, addressed the needs of semi urban settlements through environment friendly and energy independent solutions such as gravity fed water supply schemes between 2005-2009. In Tajikistan, Murat led UNICEF's child development program reaching out to 350 schools with WASH in Schools programming between 2001-2005. In Turkey, Murat served in the Emergency Response and Recovery Programme during 1999 earthquakes. Before joining UNICEF, Murat worked for two years as loss reduction engineer in water supply system rehabilitation project in Turkey.
