

WELCOME

The Welcoming Center for New Pennsylvanians is a nonprofit organization that connects newly arrived individuals from around the world with the economic opportunities they need to succeed in our region. The purpose of this Haitian Immigrant Resource Guide is to provide information about services available to those in the Philadelphia area impacted by the January 2010 earthquake in Haiti. There are many different resources available to assist you.

Due to space and other limitations, we cannot list all organizations or programs. We have tried to provide the most accurate information. It is important to contact the agency to obtain eligibility requirements, cost and other details.

ADOPTION

To bring an adopted child, including a relative or identified child, to the U.S. from Haiti, you must be a U.S. Citizen and be found eligible to adopt by the U.S. Government. Haitian adoption law requires that an adoption take place in Haiti before the child leaves the country with an American visa. Applications for guardianship for the purposes of taking children out of Haiti for adoption are not permitted. Adoptions must be approved by Haiti's courts and by the Haitian Ministry of Social Affairs' Institut du Bien Etre Social et de Recherches (OBESR), the Haitian Government's adoption investigatory agency. In addition, the child that you adopt must be an "orphan" as defined by U.S. immigration law.

Prospective adoptive parents must satisfy both Haitian adoption and U.S. immigration laws to obtain an immigrant visa for the adopted child. You should contact an attorney in the U.S. with experience in international adoption and U.S. immigration law **before** you begin the adoption. Despite a successfully completed Haitian adoption, if further investigation finds that the child does not meet the U.S. definition of "orphan", the child will not be eligible for a visa to immigrate to the U.S.

CASH ASSISTANCE

If you do not earn enough money to support yourself and your family, or if you cannot work because of a disability, you may be eligible to receive cash and employment assistance known as Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF). This is sometimes called "welfare." You must meet certain requirements. Not all immigrants are eligible. Call to confirm the days and times they are open, especially around holidays. Food from the pantries is usually free. A "Self-Declaration of Income" may be required. Some pantries also require a photo ID of the adult receiving food. Most pantries serve only clients who live in their area. Many local churches not listed here also offer emergency food help.

HEALTHCARE

EMERGENCY MEDIAL ASSISTANCE

If you need immediate medical attention, call 911. Be ready to describe how you feel and give the dispatcher your address. The dispatcher will send an ambulance to where you are. Remember, calling 911 is for emergencies only. There will be fees charged for the ambulance, and all the emergency room services as well. These can be very expensive if you do not have medical insurance. Emergency Medical Assistance, which covers treatment of emergency medical conditions, is available regardless of immigration status. PUBLIC HEALTH INSURANCE

Health insurance is not automatically provided by the government in the U.S. To find out whether you are eligible for public (government) health benefits, contact the Pennsylvania Health Law Project at 800-274-3258 or visit www.phlp.org/.

CHIP covers all uninsured children up to age 19 who are not eligible for Medical Assistance. For many families there is no cost. Families with incomes above the free CHIP limits pay low monthly premiums and co-pays.

PRIVATE HEALTH INSURANCE

If you are not eligible for public health insurance coverage, you can purchase health insurance from a private company such as Blue Cross or Aetna. Make sure to read the information carefully and ask for an explanation if you are not sure what benefits you are getting. Do not sign a contract unless you understand the cost and the requirements of the insurance you are purchasing.

If you are uninsured, expect to pay a small fee based on your family size and income. Benefits counselors are available to assist you with applying for health insurance you can afford.

HOUSING

Finding a safe and affordable place to live is one of the first steps in making your home in Philadelphia. There are many different types of housing and a wide range of prices. Finding the right place for you and your family to live will take some effort. There are several ways you can find out about apartments:

- Talk to friends and family. Personal connections can be a good way to find a place to live.
- Check with churches and other religious organizations.
- Look for lists of apartments in public places (such as a bulletin board at a grocery store) and on websites such as Craigslist. Beware of tricks. Never give your Social Security number or immigration documents to a potential landlord.

GOVERNMENT-FUNDED HOUSING HAS LONG WAITING LISTS OF MANY YEARS. DO Not believe anyone who says they can put you at the top of the list if you give them money. That is not true.

SCHOOL REGISTRATION

PRIMARY AND SECONDARY SCHOOL

All children have the right to free public school from Kindergarten through Grade 12 (the end of high school). It does not matter what kind of immigration status you or your child may have.

Each School District has its own rules for the date, time, and place for student registration. Call the district where you wish to enroll for details on the registration process.

Under the Pennsylvania Pre-K Counts program, (www.pakeys.org) younger children who qualify may be eligible for free pre-school programs. The rules for these programs depend on where you live. There are always limited seats available. It is important to get your child placed on the waiting list early. If the program is for 4-year-olds, check to see if your child can be put on the list when she is 2-1/2 or 3. REGISTER YOUR CHILD FOR SCHOOL

TO ENROLL YOUR CHILD IN SCHOOL, YOU WILL NEED TO BRING:

- **1. Proof of the child's age** (This can be a child's birth certificate from any country, a legal sworn statement by a parent or relative, or old school records)
- 2. Proof of address (For example, a lease or utility bill)
- **3. Child's immunization records** (If necessary, your old school district or a doctor can confirm by telephone that the child is immunized, and then mail the records later)

You are NOT required to show other documents

- When you enroll your child in a public, charter, or private school, you must also sign a sworn statement about your child's disciplinary record. This statement says whether your child has ever been suspended or expelled from school for certain problems, such as violence.
 - Schools cannot require ANY OTHER RECORDS, such as photo identification, Social Security numbers, visa/immigration documents, the reason the child is living with you, or a court order about the child's placement. The new school is responsible for getting the old school records. The old school must send them within 10 days of the new school's request.
 - Schools must enroll the child within 5 business days of receiving the required information. (Schools are not allowed to refuse to enroll a child because of a delay in getting old school records, or a school's trouble placing the child, or a limited number of days left in the school year.)
 - Schools MAY NOT ask about the immigration status of a child or parent as part of the admission process.

The Supreme Court has ruled that all immigrant children can go to school. *(Plyler v. Doe, 1982)*
